- 1. Write down observations, questions, impressions, items for further study, and reactions.
- 2. What, exactly, does the passage say? What is its topic?
- 3. What words, phrases, themes, symbols, or ideas are repeated from earlier parts of Revelation? How about repeated from other places in the Old Testament?
- 4. How does this passage connect to, or flow or depart from, the previous passage?
- 5. What other passages of scripture does it remind you of, and why? What cross-references are there?

Second, consider these additional questions specific to this week's passage:

- 6. What does it mean to "keep" the words of this book? (v. 3). Why will those who do so be blessed?
- 7. There were more than seven churches in Asia. Why do you think the letter was addressed "to the seven churches that are in Asia"?
- 8. The number 7 is very significant in scripture and shows up in Revelation a lot. Why is it used here?
- 9. The book of Revelation is not only a revelation *from* Jesus but also a revelation *of* him. What is revealed about Jesus in this passage?
 - a. Which things revealed about Jesus are most meaningful to you, and why? How might this make a difference in your life right now?
- 10. This passage contains several allusions to, paraphrases of, or even direct quotations from the Old Testament. Which ones do you notice? What is the significance of these?

Third, take a step back and look at the bigger picture:

- 11. What do you learn about God from this passage?
- 12. What does the passage say **about** and **to** saints?
- 13. What warnings does the passage give, and to whom?
- 14. Is there anything scary about the passage? Why is it scary, and for whom?

- 15. Is there anything confusing about the passage? What would you need to know or understand to have clarity?
- 16. Is there anything encouraging in the passage? Why, and for whom?
- 17. What overall impression does this passage give you? What adjectives would you use to describe it? Write a title for the passage in your own words that reflects the impression it gives you.

- 18. How does this passage prepare you for what you will do today (or tomorrow)?
- 19. What practical step can you take today or this week to "keep" the words of this passage and to live in light of the truths revealed?

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Second, consider these additional questions specific to this week's passage:

- 6. John uses the word "like" a lot in this passage (count them!). Why? What does this tell us about what he saw and experienced?
- 7. In 1:19, John is instructed to write down what he sees, both those things "that are" and those that "are to take place after this."
 - a. Which things revealed about Jesus are most meaningful to you, and why?
 - b. How might this make a difference in your life right now?
 - c. What is the difference?
 - d. Why was John shown **both** things "that are" and things that "are to take place"?
 - e. How do these two different categories help us understand the rest of the book?

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Second, consider these additional questions specific to this week's passage:

- 6. Jesus highlights a different aspect of himself in each letter.
 - a. Which things revealed about Jesus are most meaningful to you, and why?
 - b. How might this make a difference in your life right now?
 - c. Note how his description of himself connects to how John describes him in chapter 1
 - d. Why do you think Jesus chose to highlight what he did for each letter?
- 7. Each letter has similar parts. For each, notice:
 - a. What Jesus commended in the church
 - b. What he rebuked
 - c. What commands or instructions he gave
 - d. What the consequences will be if they fail to obey
 - e. What promises he made
- 8. How does each of these relate to the others within the individual letters?
- 9. What do you learn by comparing their differences among the different letters?

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
